# Overview of the GLBT Advocate Program



## Program Description

- ► The GLBT Advocate Program is a continuing education and engagement program for faculty and staff.
- The program is designed to provide participants with ongoing opportunities to learn and show their support as allies and advocates of the GLBT community.
- ► Through taking an intersectional look at the incredibly diverse GLBT community, participants gain a stronger understanding of gender and sexuality, beyond our Project SAFE and Trans 101 workshop.

## Learning Outcomes

#### Participants will:

- ▶ Be able to recognize manifestations of oppression (e.g. individual, interpersonal, institutional, cultural) within their classrooms, departments, and/or communities.
- ▶ Will develop skills to interrupt manifestations of oppression (e.g. individual, interpersonal, institutional, cultural) in their classrooms, departments, and/or communities.
- Will increase their understanding of theories rooted in anti-oppression as they relate to creating inclusive spaces.
- Be able to advocate for the creation inclusive spaces within their classrooms, departments, and/or communities.
- ▶ Be able to identify how their own positionality impacts their ability to disrupt systems of oppression.
- Model a social justice-oriented community that offers peer support and coalition-building.

#### Program Requirements

- Participation in the GLBT Advocate Program requires a one-year commitment that may be renewed annually in subsequent years.
- Participants must complete the following:
  - ► Attendance in (1) GLBT Advocate Program workshop
  - ► Attendance in (1) GLBT Center hosted program

### Participant Feedback

- ▶ I have found a supportive environment being a part of the Advocate program. This is key as few of my colleagues know about or appreciate diversity of any kind and are content to sit in their ivory tower of privilege. Being an Advocate allows me to learn in open spaces that are non-existent in my department/college. (Faculty Member, Second Year in Program)
- ▶ It has given me the opportunity to have these conversations because when my coworkers discover that I am in the program, they ask me questions! That has provided a "softer" entry into the conversation for many of them and added some legitimacy. I feel like my department is more likely to listen and consider what I say because I am in the Advocate Program. (In general, there are always a few...) (Faculty Member, First Year in Program)
- ▶ I'm more aware of biased thoughts that I have about other people, and more aware of how sexism, heterosexism, and transgender oppression operate. (Faculty Member, First Year in Program)
